B) Description:

This American Government course will focus on the various institutions, groups, beliefs, and ideas that constitute United States politics. Students will gain an analytical perspective on government and politics in the United States both by studying the general concepts used to interpret U. S. politics and by analyzing specific examples. Students will learn how to analyze and interpret basic data relevant to U. S. government and politics.

C) Objectives:

Upon completion of this course, the students will be able to:

- 1. Define government as a universal institution and describe its major functions.
- 2. Identify the major events and documents that contributed to the establishment of the U.S. government.
- 3. Identify the three branches of government and explain the functions and responsibilities of each one.
- 4. Illustrate the similarities and differences among national, state, and local governments.
- 5. Explain the role of political parties in the United States, past and present.
- 6. Understand the importance of citizen involvement in community service, civic improvement, and political activities.
- 7. Identify the constitutional guarantees to which an individual is entitled noting that they reflect the belief that government should protect individual rights.
- 8. Understand U.S. immigration policies and describe the immigration process.

During this course, students are encouraged to complete their community service hours as described in the School Handbook.


